Over fifty sparkling bonfires on the Shenango River, the aroma of cedar and pine in the air, flickering firelight and silhouettes of firetenders passing by the flames as you stroll along the river and city streets enjoying enchanting music, ethnic food tastings and performers from around the globe. Imagine dancing to the sounds of a big band under the stars in an outdoor ballroom after participating in unique arts experiences throughout the day with the entire family. This is WaterFire Sharon.

Each day-long event will begin at 10:00 a.m. and offer music, food and interactive arts centered on a unique theme; all free of charge to the public. Actual WaterFire performances will begin at dusk. Attendees can take leisurely boat rides during lightings,

and experience the performance in a more intimate way. Fire performers and other entertainers will add to the experience on, and around, the river—all accompanied by an enchanting mix of live and recorded music. The day will end at the WaterFire Ballroom, part of the grand WaterFire installation, and will feature live music, dance lessons and demonstrations, and open dancing under the stars.

Although WaterFire Sharon is a seasonal production, it is being built on volunteerism. In order for it to be successful, volunteers are needed year-round to assist in all aspects of event production and special projects.

At any one WaterFire lighting, up to 150 volunteers will be needed!

Representing "everyman," the traditional Greek Chorus and our communal spirit, WaterFire volunteers will be dressed in black to create an unobtrusive, ceremonial presence.

In the off-season, volunteers will be needed to help with boat building and repairs, mechanical tasks, fundraising, preparations for the next season and the occasional special project. Diverse talents are needed to make WaterFire Sharon a reality.

August 3: ArtBeat

The first event will begin with a **5K run/walk** in partnership with the Community Food Warehouse and Reyers. Throughout the day, enjoy an **arts festival and ethnic food booths**. You will be able to watch the day go by as artists trace the shadows of event happenings. At dusk, **the beats of world drums accompany the WaterFire lighting** as we celebrate the art of life. Drums represent the world's oldest and most ubiquitous musical instruments and are used in ritual ceremonies, communication, war, peace and celebration. End the day **swing dancing to the beats of Dr. Zoot** at the WaterFire Ballroom.

September 14: World Fire

The city will be sectioned into countries **exhibiting food, art, dance and music** from each culture. Using a passport to enter through elaborate doorways highlighted by sidewalk chalk paintings, spend the day exploring cultures of the world. Fire and humans have coevolved, like the bonded strands of a DNA molecule, providing social illumination and natural renewal. The two are inseparable, and together they have shaped the world landscape. World Fire celebrates the distinct differences of the cultures blended into the American melting pot and extracts them from the melting pot as individual shining flames during the **WaterFire lighting cultural parade** featuring spectacles from around the globe. Warm up with the fiery sounds of **Latin dance band Azucar** at the WaterFire Ballroom.

October 12: Up and Around

A more contemporary experience, this WaterFire will challenge everyone to view the extraordinary in unexpected places. Art has been described as the means of union among people, joining them together in the same feelings and the journey towards a collective humanity. Typically gazed upon at an individual's horizon, the expression of creative skill and imagination actually happens all around us. On October 12, look up and see **stunt kites, aerial performers and windsock artwork**. Look around for **public art displays throughout the day and during the WaterFire lighting ceremony** and performance. Close out your experience by snapping your fingers and tapping your toes at the WaterFire Ballroom with a **sock hop complete with a 50's doo wop band**.

What's In A Name?

Ever wondered where your street got its name? While some traditional street names are used – Main, State, Jefferson, 1st, 2nd, etc., many of the names originated from our city's forefathers. Here is a list of some of the ones we came up with.

John ASHTON—Owner of Alexander, Ashton and Company

Benjamin BENTLEY—First settler on 400 acres on a site in Sharon

George BOYCE—Opened coal mines in Sharon—street renamed later to Silver St.

George BOYD—President of Thomas D. West Foundry Company

William BUDD—Settled on the west side of the Shenango River

Frank BUHL—Industrialist and philanthropist—Buhl Mansion, Buhl Park, Buhl Club

Joel B. CURTIS—Opened coal mines in the Shenango Valley

John CARLEY—Partner in Wallis and Carley Construction Company

S.H. HADLEY—Superintendent of Sharon Schools in 1902

Dr. S.A. HAZEN—Practicing physician in late 1800s

Charles HEINZ—Known as the father of North Sharon

R.J.M. IRVINE—A founder and Builder in Sharon

John S. LESLIE—Operated insurance and real estate business

Samuel H. MCCLURE—Operator of Stewart Iron Works

Alexander MCDOWELL—Founder of McDowell Bank

David STAMBAUGH—Developer of east side of city from State St. to Highland Ave.



LAFAYETTE

Budd—Son of William Budd – Developer of the West Hill

Sharon Fence Completes New Distribution Center and Manufacturing Facility in Sharon, PA



In February of 2013, Sharon Fence, a wholesaler and manufacturer of fencing materials, completed construction on a new 40,000-square foot facility located

at 1 Miller Court in Sharon. The location features an office, warehouse, light manufacturing plant with a seven-ton overhead crane, and over six acres of outdoor storage for inventory.

The new Sharon facility marks a reunion of sorts between the company and its namesake city.

Sharon Fence had been located in Wheatland, Pennsylvania, since the mid-1970s, but the company kept the name because it was so well-known

by customers and vendors. So, when asked why he chose to build the new facility in Sharon, as opposed to all of the other cities, boroughs, and townships in the surrounding area, president David Smith said with a smile, "With a name like Sharon Fence, actually locating our business back into Sharon just seemed like the logical move."

In addition to the new headquarters in Sharon, the company also operates branches in Columbus, Ohio, and Buffalo, New York.

City's Housing Rehabilitation Program Continues to Gain Momentum

You may not realize it, but each year the US Department of Housing and Urban Development grants the City of Sharon federal dollars to make ADA public improvements, demolish unsafe structures, and rehabilitate residential housing where there are low to moderate income residents. The program has improved thousands of homes during its thirty year existence and helped to improve neighborhoods in Sharon.

Annually, the city rehabilitates approximately 28 houses. Rehabilitation projects include lead paint control, making energy efficient improvements,

and bringing properties up to code standards. Director of Community Development Janet Thomas says, "The housing rehabilitation program has helped to stabilize several neighborhoods in Sharon. Because we continue to experience reductions in our entitlement, the city really has to maximize its use of financial resources in order to fund housing rehab and address blight issues in Sharon."

The City of Sharon also uses its block grant funding in a variety of ways to tackle blighted vacant properties. "Demolition is only one answer to the

blighted properties, and it isn't always the best one," said director of Code Bob Fiscus. "Once a house is demolished, it's off the tax rolls forever. We try to encourage private rehabilitation, or use of Community Development funds when we can, and reserve demolition for the worst cases."

Sharon Regional Health System open heart surgery program earns national quality recognition

The Society of Thoracic Surgeons (STS) has awarded an overall 3-Star Composite Quality Rating (the highest category of quality) to the open heart bypass surgery program at Sharon Regional Health System for the period of July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012. The STS developed a comprehensive rating system for the quality of cardiac surgery among hospitals across the country and Sharon Regional's 3-Star rating places it among the top 12-15 percent open heart surgery programs nationwide.

The STS open heart bypass surgery composite score is calculated using a combination of 11 measures of quality divided into four broad categories. These categories include risk-adjusted mortality, risk-adjusted major morbidity

(the percentage of patients who leave the hospital with none of the five most serious complications of open heart bypass surgery), the percentage of open heart bypass procedures that include the use of at least one of the arteries from the underside of the chest wall (shown to function much longer than vein grafts), and how often all of the four medications believed to improve a patient's immediate and long-term outcomes were prescribed.

"Hospitals like Sharon Regional that earn a STS 3-Star open heart surgery quality rating have demonstrated their commitment to their patients and their community," said Gary Marrone, M.D., board certified cardiothoracic surgeon and medical director of the open heart surgery program at Sharon Regional.

"I'm extremely proud of our entire open heart surgery team for their efforts in ensuring our patients receive the highest quality of care."

Founded in 1964, the Society of Thoracic Surgeons is an international not-for-profit organization representing more than 6,600 cardiothoracic surgeons, researchers, and other health care professionals who are part of the cardiothoracic surgery team. The STS National Database was established in 1989 as an initiative for quality improvement and patient safety among cardiothoracic surgeons.
